

### Thursday - Thought for the Day -

For a few weeks now Local Preachers and Worship Leaders have been meeting on Tuesday mornings for a chat on Zoom, organised by Kate Rawlins. There were about ten of us linked together last week when Kate asked us what we were enjoying most about lockdown. I must admit that my first reaction was one of shock. What was there for us (mainly) golden oldies to enjoy about being told to stay at home, keep two metres apart from everyone, with all social events and gatherings cancelled and the outing of the week being an early morning visit to the supermarket with the added burden of deciding whether or not to wear a mask.

So what would your answer be? Mine was to say how much I've enjoyed the morning bird song in my garden, which seems to be much louder than in "normal" times. I've just discovered that one reason for this may be that blackbirds are building a nest in the corner at the back of a dense shrub. A lot of people mentioned the benefit of a slower pace of life, the cutting out of so much, especially meetings, providing much more time for reading, reflection, prayer and chatting on the phone.

This led me to wonder what we've enjoyed most about the new ways we've used to be "church" at this time. We have no doubt all concluded that a building does not define the church and is actually immaterial to its existence. In a small measure, we have experienced what it means for those who were and are followers of Christ who cannot show their faith by coming together in an overt way because of the hostility of the environment in which they live. Well, the church has so often flourished in such circumstances, and we have all heard accounts of those who have found a new or renewed faith in this time of lockdown. Ruth Farrant talked about one church which had begun to run an alpha course on line in the evening and was amazed by the numbers signing up for it, especially younger people, people who would normally find it difficult to leave home because of caring for their families. As we begin to wonder how to open up our buildings – and it will be lovely to be able to meet again – let us remember the lessons learnt over these last weeks and how they might impact on future plans. Do we really just want to return to the old normalities?

Last weekend Pentecost brought home to us the experience of the coming of the Spirit with the rush of violent wind and the descent of forked tongues of fire

So here we are at the end of Lockdown! Or are we? What a confusing time. I think Christina talked about the confusion last week. In a way I feel like someone about to make a parachute jump for the first time. The door is open and I am clinging fast to the door, not sure that I want to step out.

It has been a sad week. We have lost a good friend from Cheap Street Church (See news below)

Most of us have been praying for Martin Heal who has been extremely unwell for all of the lockdown period. Yesterday's news was that Martin has been taken into hospital with a perforated stomach. We await further news of a CT scan that he had on Monday. I feel sure that Pat and Martin are aware of the amazing prayer support that you are giving them.

The world news is upsetting too. George Floyd's death at the hands of a police officer in the USA has unleashed an underlying fury worldwide. How will it end? What can we do? (See Sojourners below) What I find I am doing is crying. What about you? I think it might be far more constructive for me to do as suggested. Spend time with Jesus. Listen to what the last few weeks have taught me. Pray a lot more. Then let go of the door and step out with confidence that we have a God who is with us.

#### Ministers thoughts for next Sunday June 7th.

Lectionary Readings for week beginning 7th June 2020.

Psalm 8, Genesis 1:1-24a, 2 Corinthians 13:11-13, Matthew 28:16-20.

Despite Paul's instruction in his letter to the church at Corinth, one thing which we cannot do at the moment is greet each other with a holy kiss. But what we can do is reflect on the wonder of God, and pray God's blessing on one another. The bible begins with a reflection on the greatness of God, as seen in creation, something that we find again in Psalm 8, as it reflects on the wonder of God and how God chooses to relate to us.

This Sunday is often called Trinity Sunday, and we reflect on the wonder of God, through the doctrine of the Trinity, the unity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as three persons in one Godhead. As we reflect on the wonder of God, it is something that takes us beyond the limits of our minds and imagination. We may never fully understand the wonder of God, but it is good to spend some time reflecting on the wonder of God, and all that God means to us. It is something that helps to understand and live out the roles that we have, in the world we live in.

In our world today we have spent a lot of time reflecting on the virus, Covid-19. While knowledge of it has increased, there is still much we do not know, or fully understand. But in the light of current knowledge, incomplete as it is, we are working out how we live our lives.

In our world today, it is important that we use our reflection on the wonders of God, to guide us as to how we live out our lives and change our lives and our world so that it better reflects the love of the wonderful God who created it and us. One instruction from Paul, that we can follow that will help us do this, is to bless one another with the grace of God.

'The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.'
