OUTREACH IN 2021

Outreach is a word that has been banded about at church meetings for decades and it is exciting when we step out in faith to spread God's word and show His love in ways apart from formal church services. In more recent years we have launched Senior Service and Sticky Church as well as Thought for the Day and Open the Book all of which have proved popular with targeted age groups and attracted people from beyond the immediate church family.

In 2021, as a church, we are embarking on a new project involving the shop we own at the Cheap Street entrance to our premises and currently stands vacant. We believe there are opportunities here to reach a wider community in practical ways and we hope other churches in the town will come on board.

The shop will be called The Pod which is a vessel containing seeds. In it there is hope for growth, health and nourishment. We pray that church and community will work together. There is great potential here of planted seeds bringing a fresh expression of Church.

Our Christian calling is to increase awareness of God's presence and celebrate God's love. To this end our vision is to use seasonal window displays and promote our activities which will make a more accessible way into faith for some, providing a more accessible threshold to cross than the church and open more hours.

Our calling is also to help people grow in faith and learn as Christians through mutual support and care. To do this we will help and encourage faith exploration through a

Christian book library for all ages and give out leaflets on faith and local churches to take away. There will be opportunity for discussion and prayer in the shop and the opportunity for interaction with all Sherborne churches.

We are called to be a good neighbour to those in need and to challenge injustice. With this in mind we will be a link with organisations which meet local needs and other Christian agencies like Community Aid Network, Christians Against Poverty, Sherborne Food Bank, The Rendezvous and Choose Love (items for refugees) and Acts 345, details of which can be found in the welcome area.

God wants us to make more followers of Jesus Christ and through the shop we want to connect with people in the street, a very visible Christian presence in Cheap Street. We would organise colouring competitions for the young and talk to local schools about how they can contribute to the community. We want to build relationships with people and work alongside them.

By welcoming other churches on board we would create a central focus for God's work right in the heart of our town. There will be costs but it is felt that gains in non financial ways will make it more than worthwhile. It will be a new way of seeing the church in action. One enthusiastic supporter has given £5,000 anonymously to meet initial costs

This report contains excerpts from a project plan written by Lynn Heaton and her team - a report which is fully endorsed by your church council and the church meeting. Copies of the full report, which enthused councillors, is available on line and in written form.

PRAYERS FOR THE PERSECUTED CHURCH

Oman is an absolute monarchy and the government expects obedience from its citizens. That includes following the state religion, Islam. Citizens are under strict surveillance. Legislation is based mainly on Sharia (Islamic law) and leaving Islam is seen as a betrayal of your tribe and family.

Converts from Islam are pressured to recant their faith, and can be expelled from the family home and from their jobs. In this highly conservative society, it is especially difficult for Muslim women to choose to follow Christ.

Let us pray. Loving God, please bless our brothers and sisters in Oman. Give them strength and courage as they endure abandonment and prejudice. We pray that many Omani people will discover the truth of your gospel and realise the joy of following Christ, despite the cost. Also that believers in Oman will understand how deeply they are known and loved by God, and that they will have opportunities to share the good news of Christ. **Amen.**

THE MINISTER'S THOUGHTS FOR THIS COMING WEEK

Lectionary Readings for Sunday 3rd January
2021 Christmas and Epiphany.

Psalms 72:1-14, Isaiah 60:1-6, Ephesians 3:1-12, Matthew 2:1-12.

Christmas travel, it would seem, has never been straight forward and as I write this letter Christmas travel has just got more difficult for us with only essential travel being permitted in certain Tier four parts of the country. The Christmas travel for the Magi who observed a light in the night sky that spoke to them of the birth of God's saviour would not have been easy. It is very unlikely that they were three lone individuals. It was more likely that they were a well defended group that sought permission to travel across various countries until they reached and found where the infant Jesus was, and to worship him and offer their gifts to him. The need to go to Herod's palace may not be just because it was where they expected Jesus to be born but also because they needed to pay their respects to Herod to gain his permission to travel on to where Jesus was in Bethlehem. No doubt Herod would have been made aware of their group. To not seek out Herod would have created problems for them. When they left Herod's palace with the permission to carry on, Herod would have tried to have them watched, as Herod rarely let any potential rival to him live. The Magi's return travel arrangements get altered in a dream as a result of Herod's true reaction to news of Jesus' birth and they leave Judah by a different way.

The birth of Jesus into our lives has a habit of changing our life travel plans. However and wherever we travel, we travel with God and Jesus in our lives.
