Duncan's Message

Lectionary Readings for Sunday 24th January 2021 Epiphany 3.

Psalm 62:5-12, Jonah 3:1-5, 1 Corinthians 7:29-31, Mark 1:14-20.

In our reading from Jonah, we meet Jonah as he finally does what God has asked him to do and calls the people of Nineveh to change the way they live and to do what God requires of them. It is a message that you would not expect the people of Nineveh to pay any attention to, but contrary to expectations it is a message they take to heart and change their way of life. In the past year we have had a message delivered to us about the need to change our lives due to our required response to the Coronavirus; we are now hopefully looking forward to another change of life which we hope the vaccines developed to protect us from virus will bring. One of the challenges of following Jesus is to live the new way of life that God calls us to, something Paul, in our reading from 1 Corinthians, is reminding, both us and the Church in Corinth he is writing to.

In our reading from Mark, we meet Jesus as he is calling the Galilean fishermen Simon, Andrew, James and John to a new life of following Jesus as one of his disciples. While they would occasionally fish again it was to be a total change of their lives. Not everyone would respond in the same way when Jesus called them to follow him, as in the case of the rich man in Mark 10:17-31. Our response to Jesus' call to follow him is one we continue to make as we seek with the help of the Holy Spirit to live the New Life Jesus has called us to.

Thought for the Day from Duncan Goldie

1 Corinthians 13:1-13.

Without love what are we?

This chapter from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians is a passage that we are very familiar with, and one that we frequently turn to at the significant times in our lives such as weddings and funerals. I suspect when Paul wrote this in his letter he had neither of these two life milestones in mind, but that whatever was being done or gifts that were being exercised in the church, that it would be done with a framework of selfless love, which was seeking others good and not any personal gain or enhancement.

In the ongoing events in America, we have seen a great number of people who have been exercising personal or political power for personal gain; with the selfless love that Paul talks about for others has been absent. By this Thursday there will be a new American president, hopefully without the further threatened violence, and hopefully

the new administration will exercise the power and responsibility they have been trusted with, out of selfless love without thought for any personal gain.

This is the same love that we have seen in the care which we have seen given by key workers who have risked their own physical and mental health in order to care for those who are ill or have to self-isolate. At this time we need to act out of selfless love towards one another, as we continue to wear masks, keep our distance, and look forward to a successful vaccination against the Covid 19 Virus.
