## Duncan's Message

Lectionary Readings for Sunday 21st February 2021 Lent 1.

Psalm 25:1-10 & 20, Genesis 9:8-17, 1 Peter 3:18-21, Mark 1:9-15.

As we begin Lent, the theme of temptation and the choices we are invited to make come to the fore, as we remember that Jesus took time out before he embarked on the mission his Heavenly Father had sent him into the world to do. After his baptism in the Jordan by John, Jesus knew that now was the time to begin, but how he was to do it and be true to his Heavenly Father's will was not so clear. The choices Jesus would make would determine whether or not he would fulfil his Father's will to bring God's love and forgiveness into the lives of everyone who allows Jesus into their lives.

In our Psalm, the psalmist knows his past is far from perfect, even if not any worse than anyone else's, and that he faces an uncertain future, but is seeking God's guidance, forgiveness and protection for his future. In our current circumstances, with the Covid lockdown, we all face an uncertain future, with the loss of jobs and business, new variants of the virus, and no certainty that holidays will be possible this year. In all these circumstances, it is important that we seek God's guidance in the choices we make. In Genesis, with the end of the flood God sees the opportunity to do things differently when dealing with our wrong choices, which will ultimately be dealt with through the death and resurrection of his Son Jesus. Something that Peter reminds of when he reminds us that through Jesus and our baptism we have the opportunity to make our choice in accordance with God's will.

### LENT 2021 LOCKDOWN.

The traditional thing to ask someone at the beginning of Lent is what are you giving up for Lent; it is hard to do that this year in a time that we have all had to give up so much which we would normally do in the last twelve months. For the most part we are looking forward to beginning to do again much of what we have had to give up.

As we prepare ourselves for the celebration of Easter, we remember the time that Jesus spent alone in the wilderness as he prepared himself for his preaching ministry and how he would reveal who he truly was as God's Son to us. From the accounts of Jesus' temptations we know that Jesus had some big decisions to make, as he decided the way that his heavenly Father wanted him to take, a way that would ultimately lead on to his death on the cross but also to his resurrection and ascension.

While Jesus spent time away from the normal demands of life it was not a time of doing nothing but a time of engaging in prayer and bringing the choices he had to his heavenly Father. In terms of prayer, it was a time of heightened activity, something for lesser periods of time he would repeat throughout his ministry.

This year Lent is more an opportunity to take the time to do something to prepare ourselves for Easter, whether that is online or on our own. Including taking the time to pray, or read the bible, especially the books we rarely look into, as preparation for Easter and life after Covid Lockdown.
