THOUGHT FOR THE DAY – April 22nd

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, in his foreword to the fascinating book which he commissioned for Lent, by the Revd Hannah Steele, says "Evangelism – the spreading of the gospel – requires us to tell a story that is both universal and deeply personal. Stories are how we connect, how we say something about being collectively human, how we share experiences and realize that we have shared experiences. Stories are how we make sense of the world around us and our place in it. Stories are how we learn more about our identity and our relationships to others."

So, if we want to engage in fruitful conversation with others, we need to be prepared to listen to their stories in order to understand them, and hopefully as the

relationship grows we will find opportunities to tell some of our own stories about how we came to meet with Jesus, and what He means to us in our lives. For many people, this is a scary prospect, yet Jesus spent his life telling stories, and asking people questions. I guess we all need to ask The Lord to give us confidence to step out of our comfort zones when the right moments arise.

For the past four years I have thoroughly enjoyed being a member of the ecumenical Bible Study Group which was run by the late David Smart, and is now organised by John Crossman. These sessions give us plenty of opportunities to share stories about our faith, ask each other questions, help each other with those things we don't understand, and discuss every-day issues, all in total confidence.

We're split into two groups, one which is held at Ann Smart's home in The Ridgeway on Wednesday evenings, and the other at my home in Raleigh Court, Long Street. Under current Covid restrictions we are not allowed to meet in groups indoors, so our group have not met over the past year. It is now hoped that we'll be able to meet in groups of six from 17th May, so our group will be reconvening on a weekly basis from Friday, 21st May at 2.30, for six weeks. We usually spend no more than an hour discussing the bible passage, then share tea, biscuits and friendly chat together. This all gives us a chance to really get to know each other.

During the coming session we will be studying Paul's letter to the Galatians, and John has produced an extremely helpful background paper, as well as some questions which we'll all be able to discuss together. It's very informal and everyone seems to enjoy joining in.

Since we have more than six people wishing to attend, we are hoping to split into two groups, with one meeting at Christine Rogers's home in Portman Square. We would therefore like to invite anyone interested in joining us, or finding out more, to contact either of us at the numbers below. It would be so good to have you with us so that we can gain confidence in sharing our stories together.

FROM THE CHURCH SECRETARY

The Church Council met on Tuesday and we decided that we should now be opening up the Church more in the current situation. It was unanimously agreed to have weekly Sunday services at 10.30am in the church from 2nd May, although it would still be necessary to observe Covid requirements. For those who wished to be well separated, the gallery would be available. We also decided to restart Thought for the Day from Thursday 6th May at 10.30am. For the present, we are still intending to keep the weekly newsletter going, so that those not able to attend church will still have a link with these services. Our last Sunday service on Zoom will be this coming Sunday, 25th April but we shall continue to use Zoom for meetings.

We discussed the possibility of Team Meetings, which have been missing for quite a while, and are now asking Team Chairs to consider when they might meet, either on Zoom or, for up to 6 people, in a garden or other open space. We are also inviting the Rendezvous Young Mums to return to their weekly meeting in the hall. All these decisions, are of course subject to the level of the pandemic, but we go forward in hope.

This coming Saturday we have the fulfilment of a dream, as The Pod is officially opened at 10.00am by the Mayor of Sherborne. A lot of thought, time and effort has gone into getting this project off the ground, and this will be the start of something new, engaging the local community, and something the Church

believes God is calling us to do. So please come to support all those working in The Pod at the Opening on Saturday if you can, and continue to support The Pod in the days that lie ahead. Thank you.

PRAYERS FOR THE PERSECUTED CHURCH

THE MINISTER'S THOUGHTS FOR THIS COMING WEEK

Lectionary Readings for Sunday 25th April 2021 Easter 4.

Psalm 23, Acts 4:5-12, 1 John 3:16-24, John 10:11-18.

This past week with the funeral of Prince Philip, we have seen in people's response a reaction of love; although the laying down of flowers had been discouraged, in the act of the messages attached there has been a response based on love. Again in those

whose natural response would have to been present in Windsor for the funeral, in their staying at home and watching it on television as requested by the Royal Family, there is again an act of love in these Covid 19 times.

John in his letter talks about allowing response to others as being an integral part of our loving response to God. The opening of the Cheap Street outreach project named 'The Pod' which was delayed by a week due to the funeral of the Duke of Edinburgh is a loving response to those in need in response to the love of God which we know.

In Acts, Peter when asked to explain how he was able to heal a lame man, said that it is all because of God's loving response to us, ultimately seen in what the death and resurrection of Jesus, God's Son, has brought about. It is that same love that the Psalmist expresses in Psalm 23, that no matter what is going on around us or how life is treating us, the God of love is with us.
